

Is asbestos in my school?

Asbestos-containing building materials (ACBM) may still be present in school buildings, even those built today. Schools must:

- Inspect their schools for ACBM
- Prepare an asbestos management plan (AMP)
- Take action to prevent or reduce asbestos hazards

Does AHERA apply to my school?

AHERA applies to K-12 public and private non-profit schools, including public school districts, charter schools and schools affiliated with religious institutions.

Is asbestos exposure dangerous?

Asbestos exposure may occur when ACBM is disturbed or damaged in some way to release asbestos fibers into the air. Exposure to asbestos can increase your risk of developing asbestos related diseases.

What are the AHERA requirements?

- Inspect or assume suspect ACBM
- Obtain exclusion statement if no ACBM
- · Develop, maintain, and update an AMP
- Appoint a trained Designated Person to ensure the AHERA responsibilities are properly implemented
- Provide asbestos-awareness training for custodial and maintenance staff that work in buildings with ACBM
- Act to prevent or reduce asbestos hazards
- Ensure that trained and licensed professionals perform inspections and take response actions
- Perform 6-month periodic surveillance of ACBM
- Reinspect ACBM every 3 years
- Post warning labels next to ACBM in routine maintenance areas
- Inform parents, teachers and employee organizations annually of the asbestos management plan and asbestosrelated activities
- Make AMPs available for review at each school within 5 working days of request.
