
TCEQ's Mission Statement



Recent New

- The state of Neavo León created a new agency dedicated to air quality management and menitoring. The Ministransy melopola has struggled with poor air quality in recent years and seen their vehicle fleet more than double in size since 2015. A day after her appointment by Governor Carria, Director Armandina Valdoz Cavasco met with the TCEO Border Affairs team to discuss joint projects on forecasting, modeling, and monitoring (CL UniversalOVASC Noticios).
- According to the CONAGUA Drought Monitor, Nueve Larede is no longer disselfed under eatheres drought conditions due to unreasonate insirial of more than 4.5 inches. Recent rains and water transfers from the Amistad Reservoir incressed the storage at the Falcon Reservoir from 12% to 23%. (II Mafaca)
- A recent report from the Nature Conservancy and the Texas Living Waters
 Project found that water market activity is increasing across the state,
 especially in the last decade, and that environmental transactions are the
 largest growth area in Texas water markets. (The Nature Conservancy)
- The Mexican federal government is properly a decree for publication in the Official Federal Journal that will prohibit issuring new water concessions for industrial use due to scarce water resources, authorizing only Mexican President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador to lesue concessions. A representative of the Confederation of industrial Chambers (CONCAMN) said that the decree must consider water usage as some industries consume less for their operations. (IZI)
- The proposed revision to the Muxican general water law will be reviewed by governmental entities, universities, and water specialists in the coming months.
 This process aims to ensure a general consensus is reached before the Senate convenes in September. (i.e. Jornada)
- The Public Services Department of Nuevo Laredo, Tameulipas collected more than 77,400 scrap time from the streets and dump sites as part of a scrap tire cleanup campaign. Nuevo Laredo is exploring alternatives to reduce dumping, such as collection sites and processing operations. (E. Mafana)

Dear Mr. President:

As your federal advisory committee for environmental and infrastructure issues along the U.S. border with Mexico, the members of the Good Neighbor Environmental Board (GNEB) are pleased to provide this advice letter about the unmet drinking water and wastewater infrastructure needs for hundreds of thousands of Americans along the southwest border. This advice letter serves as the Board's report for 2022 and will be followed in 2023 with a full, detailed report documenting and elaborating on the themes and recommendations described in this letter.

Border Context


The southern U.S. border region includes the counties immediately adjacent to the U.S.–Mexico border or located partially within the zone that extends 60 miles north of the international boundary; this is referred to as the "border area" or "border region." This area is the poorest region of the country, with per capita incomes, health outcomes and education levels well below the national average. Nearly 1 million border residents live in colonias and rural settlements, and more than two dozen U.S. federally recognized tribes are located in the region. Numerous urban and rural populations in the border area are underserved in terms of water and wastewater infrastructure. The intersection of poverty, ethnicity, and lack of basic water and sanitary services has created enduring inequities and an environmental and public health crisis along the southern border.






Paso del Norte Ceilometer Network

TCEQ manages a project with the University of Texas at El Paso and the Autonomous University of Ciudad Juárez to operate 4 ceilometers

- A ceilometer measures the boundary layer/cloud height/mixing layer; vital to understand ozone formation and PM transport and dispersion.
- Data analysis on PM2.5 source apportionment and dispersion is conducted by Dr. Rosa Fitzgerald
- Data used for modeling and forecasting













Binational Network: air quality sensors in the Paso del Norte

Task 1: Monitoring PM and NO₂ at 6 low-income community centers in El Paso

Task 2: Monitoring PM and NO₂ at 6 industrial sites and community centers in Ciudad Juarez


Binational Diesel Emmissions Reduction for the Paso del Norte

Clean Transportation Zone





1944 Water Treaty and Water Deliveries

In 2020, minute 325 created two Work Groups with technical experts from both countries to enhance information exchange, develop a water availability model, and use the model as a tool to analyze water management scenarios.

Lower Rio Grande Water Quality Initiative: Salinity Study

This binational partnership aims to restore and protect water quality, enhance monitoring efforts, and reduce pollutants entering the river.

Under the Border 2025 program we created the LRGWQI Binational Forum (bajobravolowerriograndewq.org)

A comprehensive analysis is underway to identify the sources of salinity and understand their contributions to the Rio Grande.

This includes examining point sources, irrigation return flows, and other potential factors, utilizing a mass balance model.















Texas-Mexico Environmental Fellowship

TCEQ partnered with UT Austin to sponsor and support internships with Mexican state and federal agencies in support of Border 2025 and TCEQ's MOCs.
