Hurricane Harvey

- TMA Disaster Relief Fund

- Assist patients with accessing pharmacies for prescriptions

TMA Policies on Preparedness

- TMA Disaster Preparedness Planning & Response policy:
 - Collaboration & communication with DSHS
 - Promote physician participation in state & local planning & response
 - Utilize county medical societies
 - Disseminate timely information
 - Advocate for disaster planning measures
- Minimum Disaster Preparedness Standards for Assisted Living
- Voluntary Unique Patient Identifier
- Good Samaritan and Charitable Immunity Laws
- Bioterrorism & Bioterrorism Education



Strategic National Stockpile

- Federal funds authorized for state stockpiles; currently waiting on federal funding and rulemaking
- States can pursue funding to create their state-specific or regional stockpile program
- Texas has authority to approve and create stockpile program
- 88R Article II Budget Rider 36 Strategic National Stockpile for Health Emergency Preparedness and Response: "...[For DSHS]...to establish, expand, or maintain a stockpile of appropriate medicines, medical devices, protective equipment, and other supplies determined necessary by this state to respond to a disaster..."


- Accessible to physicians, health departments, and other health professionals
- The registry helps ensure individuals only receive the vaccines they need
- Identifies first-responders and their vaccination status to ensure the full protection during an emergency

- Obstacles to optimal function:
 - Six different consent types
 - Premature deletion of records if consent is obtained during an emergency
 - Communication of impending deletion
 - Opt-in right now vs. Opt-out



Vaccine Hesitancy

- Challenges
 - Efforts to ban mRNA vaccines in Texas
 - Efforts to add an additional consent form
 - General misinformation
 - DNA and gene therapy
 - Microchips, magnetism
 - Fertility
 - Increase in childhood vaccine exemptions
