Current Activities

Members of the Disparities PAW work together on the following activities:

- Distribute educational tools, including:
 - Community Advisory Board Best Practices Guide
 - Hepatitis B and C and Liver Cancer Booklet
- Develop a best practices booklet on social determinants of health in cancer care.
- Leverage current member networks and plan outreach strategies to engage new members, particularly in East Texas and the border region.
- Develop an archive of community outreach activities for resource sharing and reporting.
