Consent to Release Information

Why is my baby having a hearing screening?

Your baby is having a hearing screening as part of routine infant testing. Babies are tested so if a child does have hearing loss, follow-up care may start immediately. If hearing loss is not detected early, significant delays may occur. Hearing loss can cause delays in speech, language, emotional, and educational development. Early identification of hearing loss ensures the child has the opportunity for normal development.

Why should I give consent to release information?

Giving consent to release information helps ensure your baby gets the resources you may need. Follow-up care can include:

- additional hearing screening,
- diagnostic audiology assessment,
- medical evaluation by a specialist, and
- early childhood intervention.

Reporting hearing screening results is required by Texas Health and Safety Code Chapter 47, Hearing Loss in Newborns.
